Concise summary – expanded stories with photo documentation on subsequent pages

- **▼ EWB** (with help of Mingas, of course! and our volunteers):
 - built protective concrete box around spring to prevent surface water contamination
 - built pressure break/sediment concrete tank and tied this into a 1300 liter plastic tank
 - ◆ added/repaired 300 m of 40 mm PVC to Colegio, shower, pila, several houses.
 - ♦ more student environmental education
 - updating of mapping of primary potable water lines & identified various problem areas
 - ♦ AND fixed school shower which was the focus of my first PPT to EWB in June, 2006!



♥ Rotary Club

- ◆ Eden met with the Latacunga RC and they have agreed to do their part on the International Matching Grant. Now, Eden and his committee along with the technical advice of EWB needs to complete and submit it.
- ◆ Eden is VERY committed to helping the Malinguans and area in a multitude of ways. He has SO MANY BIG ideas that he simply needs to write his own newsletter.

▼ Some Enrichment Activities

- Sanne, the Dutch medical intern, gave several lectures on Family Planning
- ♦ Brett, the Aussie volunteer working as our cook and interpreter, gave a lecture on nutrition.
- ◆ *First ever* Games and Puzzles: croquet, badminton, rummikub (a board game), and the first ever puzzles (they call rompecabezas break the head).

▼ Educational Accomplishments

- ◆ We met with La Dirección de Educación and they gave us the forms to apply to change from private to public school. If granted, this means that the government will start supporting the school, i.e. paying for teachers, texts, etc. instead of Centro Educativo La Minga, Inc.
- ♦ We hired 3 new FABULOUS Colegio (our jr-sr high) teachers. So we now have 4 teachers with <70 students ages 11 on up.
- ◆ For the <u>0 11 year olds</u>, we have **now** have 3 separations: <u>ages 0 - 5</u> in a cleaner kindergarten with supervisors; ages 5-6 in pre-school;

ages 6 - 11 unfortunately all 50 with one teacher.





Rodrigo, age 23 has enrolled with our Novenos (~ 12-13 yr olds) to improve his education as he was successfully voted in as Treasurer of Malingua Pamba. He's the tall one in **blue cap.**)





▼ Planting the Seed of Microfinance

- ♦ With help of Kathie A. who spent one day in M.P. teaching handicrafts a few days before we arrived, and got 7 boxes of fabric donated; hence, we planted the idea of starting their own businesses.
- Gabriel and his wife applied & received the FIRST loan to start making clothing. He couldn't write up his own contract, but got Lautaro, one of my guaguas, to help him.
- ◆ With the addition of our latest sewing machine, Ellen helped Willian make this shirt.







In spite of the fact that they had NO idea how to do a puzzle, they would not stop until it was completed. It took 4.5 hours & totally deserved the Spanish name "rompecabeza – break the head - or at least it wanted to break mine! I was in tears at my pride and amazement at their commitment to complete a task regardless of the hurdles. Brett observed that these people are so accustomed to pushing through the pain (aka suffering) that it didn't occur to them to give up until they completed the task at hand. No wonder I love these people!














← Debbie Hathaway leading her Ambiental Group, the group of Colegio students taking water measurements ⇒ using a GPS, receiving special training, and more.
